



WILL BRUDER SPEAKS OF DESIGN AS IF IT'S POETRY. And looking at his estate carved into the side of Mummy Mountain in Paradise Valley, AZ, one might assume he's not only a poet, but he's a sculptor as well. The internationally celebrated architectural firm, Will Bruder Architects of Phoenix, AZ, has been defining their niche in the world of architecture since 1974 our unique desert environment. This home is no different.

With more than 450 commissions to date, their reputation for creating beautiful, culturally significant buildings like the Phoenix Central Library, Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art, and the Nevada Museum of Art is well deserved. The project was a tear-down remodel originating with the owner's desire for an elegant residence that showcased their 200-plus-piece collection of art and furniture, including many museum-quality pieces.
